



## Primary PE and Sport Premium Funding 2021/2022

Key Achievements to Date:	Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:
<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>All staff have been given the opportunity to ask for CPD in areas they feel they need more support and development and have used the Rising Stars documents to support their delivery.</li><li>100% of PE lessons observed have been judged to be at least good or better, where monitoring shows that objectives, key vocabulary, and skills are shared effectively within the lesson and that teachers feel confident and well-equipped to deliver innovative and differentiated lessons.</li><li>Teachers are continuing to demonstrate confidence and competence to deliver high quality PE to all children. Staff are now confident to use a range of teaching and learning styles in PE to match lesson content. Children are now experiencing a broader and engaging curriculum. Our PE curriculum is wide and varied, including multi-skills/ football/rugby/ gymnastics, dance, netball, and cricket to ensure children are confident to try new sports</li><li>Through working with MAT leaders and other PE leaders within the MAT, we have developed a comprehensive PE intent and assessment processes that will accurately track achievement, progression and identify next steps. These will be fully implemented in Autumn 2022.</li><li>The range of extra-curricular activities in school has increased and we have aimed to target key skills including those needed to develop to take part in the Farnworth cluster competitions.</li><li>Due to the pandemic, the extra swimming sessions that we usually arrange for Year 6 pupils were cancelled last year. 		Sustainability and suggested next steps:  Targeted swimming lessons have been planned to take place again this year.  Lunchtime supervisors need to be encouraged to continue this initiative with all year groups as some of the KS2 children have not been completing the activities as regularly as some of the younger children. The work with Elite and the games bags seem to be having more of a positive impact than the elite gym scheme. Pupil voice and questionnaires used to discuss current PE sessions, variety of after school clubs and competitions on offer and about skills they feel they need to develop.  This area is completed but Mrs Belfield is still looking in to possible flooring/letting the grass grow before it is opened back up to the children.  To sustain this approach, resources will need to be regularly evaluated with pupils

To provide gymnastics CPD for staff as staff questionnaires evidenced a lack of confidence in this area.	Beth Tweddle Gymnastics will teach two classes once a week for a 10 week block. Each class in KS1 and 2 will have the opportunity to work with a specialist gymnastic coach. Teachers will be learning alongside the coach to develop their technical vocabulary, understanding of how to teach a gymnastic lesson and sequence a unit of work.	£2,850	Success Criteria: 100% of staff questionnaires will evidence that teachers feel confident to teach gymnastics. 85% of pupils will reach ARE for gymnastics.  End of Year Impact:	Monitor through staff questionnaires and continue to ask staff if they require any further CPD.  Staff still strongly support the delivery of gymnastics through the Beth Tweddle Gymnastics coaching. The children are making good progress.
To continue to provide CPD for staff in a wide range of physical activities.  This intention also promotes a broad range of sports on offer for the children.	CPD sessions from Elite Sports provide teachers with opportunities to team teach and receive additional support on how they can improve the quality of P.E teaching. Teachers receive a feedback form and advice from the coach on aspects that they can improve further. Sessions are taught twice a week so each teacher from Reception to Year 6 will benefit.	£6,622.76	Success Criteria: 85% of pupils will reach ARE for PE. 100% of lessons observed taught by teachers will be good or better.  End of Year Impact:	Monitor through staff questionnaires and continue to ask staff if they require any further CPD. Also monitor through lesson observations to ensure that teachers are fully benefitting from the team teach approach.  This is an area we need to now move away from in the next academic year as staff are now confident enough to teach PE for themselves with their own classes.

School Farnworth cluster competition calendar	£700	<p>Success Criteria: Evidence will show that all age groups and varying abilities have had opportunities to take part in competitive sport. 100% of pupils questioned will demonstrate and enjoyment and improved confidence to take part in competitions.</p> <p>So far this year we have had 17 children compete in competitions from Y1/2. 7 of these children were pupil premium and in the summer term another 7 children will be participating in competition. There have been some competitions cancelled this year due to restrictions.</p> <p>We have had 25 children compete in competitions from Y3/4 and 6 children were pupil premium.</p> <p>We have had 25 children compete from year 5/6 and 15 of those were pupil premium. Another 30 children will be competing competitions in the summer term.</p> <p>End of Year Impact:</p>	Continue to participate in the Farnworth Cluster competition calendar events. These again have been very successful, and the children really enjoy participating in events with other schools.
