What a fantastic, and very busy, time we have had at St James. The academic year got off to a flying, or should I say bouncy, start with an 'inflatable day' during the first week back. We were thrilled in October after our visit from Ofsted where the final report shows we are good in all areas with an outstanding Early Years. The report highlights that "pupils enjoy being a part of this welcoming school". The staff team at St James work tirelessly to ensure pupils receive the best possible education, so we were really pleased that the inspectors noted that "the school holds high ambition for its pupils to achieve well". Our children in the early years "settle well" and are "exceptionally well behaved". The report states that "behaviour across the school is generally positive and learning is rarely interrupted". The pupils of St James are an absolute credit to our school, our trust and to their parents, which our Ofsted report really showcased.

There is no surprise that December was a busy month, starting with our hugely successful Enterprize Week and Christmas Markets. Our Reception and KS1 Christmas performances did not disappoint with wonderful singing and great confidence shown from the children. Our Nursery and Little Saints children put on a 'Pop Up Nativity' with the support from the Children Changing Places Project team. We really had some born actors steal the show!

Our Shades Ambassadors planned and delivered a Shades Day across the school. Our Shades Ambassadors work hard to raise awareness about racial injustice. The day started with an assembly, where the Shades Ambassadors shared important messages about racism. Each class then chose a Black History Hero to focus on, which resulted in a whole school showcase at the end of the day. Each child got the opportunity to make a Shades bracelet, choosing 10 beads to put on their band, each bead having a specific meaning such as 'hope' 'peace' 'golden rule' 'say no to racism'. Christmas at Bishop Bridgeman



The shades ambassadors visited nursery and reception creating a wonderful handprint display for the school corridor. They talked about how everyone is different and special in their own way.




Remembrance and Church Conference.
